

Course Description:

This course covers the cultural region of South Asia, which includes the countries of India, Pakistan, Nepal, Bangladesh, Bhutan, Sri Lanka and the Maldives, and occasionally Afghanistan, Tibet, and Burma, as well as the large South Asian diaspora around the world. Through a study of the region's geography and history, we will challenge a-historical representations of South Asia as timeless, spiritual, poor and conflict-ridden. Then we will shift to thinking about South Asia less as a place and more as a symbol referencing particular responses to universal questions, such as: What does it mean to be a person? How should society be organized? What causes violent conflict? Finally, we will end the class by considering what the South Asian experience in the U.S. can teach us about immigration, racism and structural violence. In addition to reading academic texts, students will gain an appreciation for the region through films, literary fiction, and blogs.

Course Structure:

The course is 100% online and asynchronous. It will consist of three units: (1) Geography & History (4 weeks); (2) Culture & Conflict (7 weeks); (3) Global diaspora (3 weeks).

Pre-requisites: There are no pre-requisites for the course

Course Objectives: By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Critique how South Asia has been imagined in the U.S.
- 2. Identify the role of history and geography in producing South Asia as a cultural region.
- 3. Apply cultural concepts and theories inspired by South Asian societies.
- 4. Challenge the many myths about South Asian societies and conflicts.
- 5. Analyze what the South Asian diaspora can teach us about immigration, racism, and structural violence in the U.S.

- Be cautious when using humor or sarcasm in emails or discussion posts as tone can be difficult to interpret digitally.
- Avoid using "text-talk" unless explicitly permitted by your instructor.
- Proofread and fact-check your sources.
- Keep in mind that online posts can be permanent, so think first before you type.

Student Expectations

- 1. Lectures/Reading: For every lesson, listen to and view the lecture(s) and complete the reading.
- 2. Syllabus Quiz: During the first week of class, complete the quiz covering the syllabus.
- 3. Activities: Complete six online interactive "activities". Although ungraded, the corresponding discussions, webcams and papers will be based on these activities.
- 4. Discussions: Complete 6 discussions. Each discussion will be worth five points and consist of three submissions: the original post (3 pts.) due Thursday and two responses (1 pt. each) due Sunday.

5. Webcam discussions: Complete 3 short video posts. In response to a given course-related question, each student will make 3-minute videos on their computers and upload them to Canvas discussion boards. The goal of the webcam is to verbally articulate an argument in a concise and precise manner. This does not mean an editorial or opinion piece, but rather it requires using course material to formulate an analytical argument. Audio-recordings without video will be accepted. Like the discussions, students will post video on Thursday (3pts.) and two responses (video or written) by Sunday (1 pt. each).

- 6. Papers: Write and submit three papers. For each paper, students will need to apply course material to their own observations, experiences, or independent research. Submit as a word document and upload to Canvas. Rubrics will be provided.
- 7. Quizzes: Complete 4 quizzes. Each quiz will consist of 15-20 multiple choice, multiple answer, T/F, and matching questions. Students will be given 60 minutes to complete them, and will be allowed to make two attempts of which the final score will be the average.
- 8. Core questions: at the end of the term, students will be asked to answer two short questions in compliance with UNT's Core assessment.

1. Attendance Policy

Although the course will have no synchronous meetings, students are required to log-in to the course's Canvas shell multiple times each week.

3. Assignment Policy

The due dates, instructions, and submission process for each assignment are provided in the course schedule and in each week's module.

The University is committed to providing a reliable online course system to all users. However, in the event of any unexpected server outage or any unusual technical difficulty which prevents students from completing a time sensitive assessment activity, the instructor will extend the time windows and provide an appropriate accommodation based on the situation. Instructor Responsibilities and Feedback

- It is the instructor's responsibility to facilitate a learning environment in which students feel comfortable and prepared to engage in provocative conversations and debates. The instructor will also provide clear instructions and evaluation criteria for each learning activity, and accessible course material.
- I aim to return graded work to you within one week of the due date. When this is not possible, I will send an announcement to the class.
- **4. Submitting Late Work:** No coursework will be accepted via email. Late work will only be accepted if the student requests an extension at least 24 hours before the deadline. Sometimes technology fails; therefore, it is recommended that you do not wait until the last minute to submit your work. Turn assignments in early. Without an excuse, the student must provide documentation of a <u>university-excused absence (opens in a new window) (Links to an external site.)</u>.
- **5. Course Communication:** I expect you to check your UNT email on a regular basis, as this will be the only format for all course communication outside of the classroom. I require 24 hours to respond to any emails sent between Monday and Friday. Over the weekends and on holidays I require 48 hours to respond. Please include the name of the course you are taking with me in the body of your email. If you email me with a question that the syllabus answers, <u>I will not reply to you</u>. If you are writing an email from a mobile device, please remember to use a formal tone (salutations, full sentences, correct spelling and punctuation, signature).

6. Extra Credit: Students will have the following opportunities to gain extra credit:

1. If more than 67% of the class completes the end-of-the-year SPOT evaluation, each student will receive 1% extra credit point added to their final grade.

Important Notice for F-1 Students taking Distance Education Courses

Federal Regulation

To read detailed Immigration and Customs Enforcement regulations for F-1 students taking online courses, please go to the <u>Electronic Code of Federal Regulations website</u> (http://www.ecfr.gov/). The specific portion concerning distance education courses is located at Title 8 CFR 214.2 Paragraph (f)(6)(i)(G).

The paragraph reads:

(G) For F-1 students enrolled in classes for credit or classroom hours, no more than the equivalent of one class or three credits per session, term, semester, trimester, or quarter may be counted toward the full course of study requirement if the class is taken on-line or through distance education and does not require the student's physical attendance for classes, examination or other purposes integral to completion of the class. An on-line or distance education course is a course that is offered principally through the use of television, audio, or computer transmission including open broadcast, closed circuit, cable, microwave, or satellite, audio conferencing, or computer conferencing. If the F-1 student's course of study is in a language study program, no on-line or distance education classes may be considered to count toward a student's full course of study requirement.

University of North Texas Compliance

To comply with immigration regulations, an F-1 visa holder within the United States may need to engage in an on-campus experiential component for this course. This component (which must be approved in advance by the instructor) can include activities such as taking an on-campus exam, participating in an on-campus lecture or lab activity, or other on-campus experience integral to the completion of this course.

If such an on-campus activity is required, it is the student's responsibility to do the following: (1) Submit a written request to the instructor for an on-campus experiential component within one week of the start of the course.

(2) Ensure that the activity on campus takes place and the instructor documents it in writing with a notice sent to the International Student and Scholar Services Office. ISSS has a form available that you may use for this purpose.

Because the decision may have serious immigration consequences, if an F-1 student is unsure about his or her need to participate in an on-campus experiential component for this course, s/he

should contact the UNT International Student and Scholar Services Office (telephone 940-565-2195 or email international advising @unt.edu) to get clarification before the one-week deadline.

Student Verification

Transmission and Recording of Student Images in Electronically-Delivered Courses

- 1. No permission is needed from a student for his or her image or voice to be transmitted live via videoconference or streaming media, but all students should be informed when courses are to be conducted using either method of delivery.
- 2. In the event an instructor records student presentations, he or she must obtain permission from the student using a signed release in order to use the recording for future classes in accordance with the Use of Student-Created Work guidelines above.
- 3. Instructors who video-record their class lectures with the intention of re-using some or all of recordings for future class offerings must notify students on the course syllabus if students' images may appear on video. Instructors are also advised to provide accommodation for students who do not wish to appear in class recordings.

Example: This course employs lecture capture technology to record class sessions. Students may occasionally appear on video. The lecture recordings will be available to you for study purposes and may also be reused in future course offerings.

No notification is needed if only audio and slide capture is used or if the video only records the instructor's image. However, the instructor is encouraged to let students know the recordings will be available to them for study purposes.
