Take home essay questions following each fieldwork exercise (4x). These assignments are practice in analyzing your experiential work in terms of the concepts we are discussing in class. 300-500 words.

Midterm Exam

A take home essay targeting a concept based question. 500-700 words.

Final Exam

A take home essay that develops an original research question based on preliminary research encounters. 1000-1500 words.
