That's Great and All, but what do YOU do?






Here are some of the roles I've played with the City of Dallas:

Data!

Planners collect data.

Quantitative, qualitative, primary and secondary in preparing plans, strate-gies, to visualize demographic, physical, social conditions and change!

Planners Analyze and Interpret data, reports, plans, policy for relevance, context, accuracy, often from a wide variety of sources in order to inform decision makers on complex issues!

Cultural Curiosity and Sensitivity!



Planners must be sensitive to the highly varied social contexts in which they operate. Every neighborhood is unique in terms of relationships to the political process and concerns and priorities for city action. Planners must be able to observe, listen, and be flexible in their plans and programs, particularly for traditionally disadvantaged neighborhoods and communities!

Planners must function in highly political environments with conflicting agendas, community priorities, and technical frameworks. They must be able to interpret and balance all of these priorities and sources of input to encourage polices that meets the always nebulous "public good"!
