# **Anthropology in My Work Today**


### **Deep Cultural Understanding**

- Military culture is UNIQUE, yet nearly all cultural descriptive work has been done by psychologists, sociologists, and social workers.
- Halfie Anthropology (or even quarter anthropology) allows for better navigation between emic (insider) and etic (outsider) reflections on data.
- Informs both program delivery and program evaluation – how to word questions, what is appropriate to ask, etc.

### Education

- Capacity building with clients to empower them to measure and communicate their program outcomes.
- Most clients are not social scientists. A primary job is educating them on relevant standards, ethics, etc.
- > Gender identity and race/ethnicity questions
- > How to store data and who should have access to it

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ervice Development: Most of our client contracts re for engagements lasting 12 months or more and cart at around \$80,000.

- Funders expect to see program evaluations before they provide funding but often will not fund evaluations.
- Development of less expensive, short-term contracts to make evaluation more accessible.

### **Methods-Driven Evaluation**

- The anthropological toolkit translates directly to evaluation work:
- > Participant observation through site visits with clients allows observation of programs and services
- > Surveys, interviews, and focus groups
- > Social network analysis and pile sorts add depth
